- Whānau Ora is an inclusive interagency approach to providing services and opportunities to all New Zealand families in need.
 - Whānau Ora is about a transformation of whānau – with whānau who set their own direction. It is driven by a focus on outcomes: that whānau will be self-managing; living healthy lifestyles; participating fully in society; confidently participating in te ao Māori; economically secure and successfully involved in wealth creation; and cohesive, resilient and nurturing.
 - Jointly implemented by Te Puni Kōkiri and the Ministries of Social Development and Health, Whānau Ora requires multiple government agencies to work together with whānau rather than separately with individual family members.
 - Some whānau will want to come up with their own ways of improving their lives and may want to work on this with a hapū, iwi or a non-government organisation (NGO). Other whānau will want to seek help from specialist Whānau Ora providers who will offer wrap-around services tailored to their needs.
 - The Whānau Ora approach will continue to evolve and, in the first few years, is expected to impact on:
 - whānau building their capability to be more self-managing;
 - providers of services to whānau;
 - whānau who use those services; and
 - government agencies that fund services to whānau.
 - Budget 2011 invested another \$30 million in Whānau Ora adding to the \$134 million over four years provided in Budget 2010.

GOVERNANCE GROUP

- The Whānau Ora Governance Group is responsible for overseeing the implementation of Whānau Ora.
- The Governance Group advises the Minister Responsible for Whānau Ora on policy settings, priorities and regional management.
- The group also provides leadership and co-ordination across government agencies and other stakeholders to encourage involvement in Whānau Ora.
- Membership includes three community representatives and the chief executives of Te Puni Kōkiri, the Ministry of Social Development and the Ministry of Health.
- Rob Cooper – the chair of the Governance Group – is currently on leave. The community members are Professor Sir Mason Durie (interim chair), Nancy Tuaine and Doug Hauraki (interim appointee).
- Te Puni Kōkiri works closely with the Ministries of Social Development and Health to support the Governance Group to implement Whānau Ora.

REGIONAL LEADERSHIP GROUPS

- Ten Whānau Ora Regional Leadership Groups have been established around the country based on Te Puni Kōkiri regional boundaries.
- Their role is to provide regional strategic leadership to ensure whānau-centred initiatives contribute in positive and realistic ways to local communities.
- They do this by fostering local communications and relationships, and ensuring there is co-ordination with other local and regional initiatives and services.
- Members include between three and seven community representatives and three officials – one each from Te Puni Kōkiri, the Ministry of Social Development and local District Health Boards.
- The members come from diverse backgrounds and have expertise and skills in health and social services, whānau development and community development.

PROVIDER COLLECTIVES

- Twenty-five Whānau Ora provider collectives were selected to develop whānau-centred services in 2010.
- Whānau Ora providers continue to deliver existing services to their communities while completing their Programmes of Action (POA) setting out how they will develop and provide whānau-centred services.
- Some provider POAs include trialling the role of ‘navigators’ or skilled workers who support whānau to identify their needs, develop a plan of action to address those needs and help whānau gain access to a range of health and social services.
- In 2012, development work is extending Whānau Ora to other regions including Kaipara, Hauraki, South Waikato, Taupō and Tūrangi, Palmerston North, Wairarapa, Levin and Kapiti Coast, and Murihiku (Southland).

WHĀNAU INTEGRATION, INNOVATION AND ENGAGEMENT FUND

- The Whānau Integration, Innovation and Engagement Fund assist whānau-led development and supports whānau to engage with each other and with other whānau, communities and providers.
- The WIIE Fund aims to build whānau capability, strengthen whānau connections, support the development of whānau leadership and enhance best outcomes for whānau.
- The fund is open to whānau working with Whānau Ora providers and other NGOs including iwi, hapū, rūnanga, whānau trusts and marae committees.
- In the 2010/11 year, there were 221 applications to the WIIE Fund with total funding of \$5,443,991 approved.

- Activities funded include developing whānau plans, implementing priority parts of whānau plans, producing information and resources for whānau, and supporting whānau-based activities.
- Regional Leadership Groups help to identify regional priorities and guide decision-making for the WIIE Fund.

RESEARCH, EVALUATION AND MONITORING

- Research, evaluation and monitoring will measure results and gauge the success of the design, implementation and impact of Whānau Ora.
- Action researchers are working with provider collectives, communities and whānau to gather evidence so the systems, processes and programmes to deliver whānau-centred services are continually refined and improved.
- They are currently carrying out interviews to gather information about whānau expectations and experiences of services and providers.
- The results from the action research will guide and inform the future development of Whānau Ora.
- A formal programme evaluation will look at the broader success of the Whānau Ora approach in terms of design, implementation and impact.
- Separate monitoring will identify progress towards achieving Whānau Ora outcomes.
