
Training Criteria

To access training participants must meet all of the following criteria:



- » Must be an active Māori Warden.
- » All training requests must be endorsed by District or Sub-Association.
- » A basic level of writing and reading comprehension is desirable.
- » A certain level of fitness is required for some courses.
- » Participants must stay for the full duration of the course.

To register approach your local District or Sub Association.



Training Programmes

ADVOCACY TRAINING

This course introduces participants to the rights of children and young people as provided for under the United Nation's Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCROC). It also provides tools that can be used when advocating for and on behalf of children and young people.

The course is designed to be interactive and draws as much as possible on the experience of Māori Wardens.

The course is held locally.

CRITERIA

- » A minimum of 15 participants and up to a maximum of 20 participants are to be confirmed before training can happen.
- » The course is held across two full days.
- » All participants **must** stay for the whole course to be certified.

Course costs will be met by the Māori Wardens Project once confirmation that the criteria has been met.



AKORANGA PIRIHIMANA -

Modular Training

This course replaces the former three-day Police Foundation Training delivered by the NZ Police to Māori Wardens nationally. It introduces participants to a range of different Acts of Parliament that impact on the work of Māori Wardens especially rangatahi, whānau and their communities. In many instances this work extends beyond the powers of the Māori Community Development Act 1962.

There are 17 modules to choose from and each module has a time allocation. Groups choose modules relevant to their needs. A minimum of four hours is required to run a course.

The course is held locally.

CRITERIA

- » A minimum of 15 participants and up to a maximum of 20 participants are to be confirmed before training can happen.
- » All participants **must** stay for the whole course to be certified.

Course costs will be met by the Māori Wardens Project once confirmation that the criteria has been met.

CO-ORDINATED INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

LEVEL 2

This course teaches unit standard 17279; "demonstrate knowledge of the function and operation of the New Zealand Co-ordinated Incident Management System (CIMS)".

This is held at a local NZ Fire Service station nationwide and is a full oneday course.

CRITERIA

- » A minimum of 15 participants are to be confirmed before training can happen.
- » All participants **must** stay for the whole course to be certified.

Course costs will be met by the Māori Wardens Project once confirmation that the criteria has been met.

Fire Rescue and First Response Ltd is the preferred national provider for the delivery of the CIMS L2 course to Māori Wardens.



CO-ORDINATED INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM LEVEL 4

This course teaches unit standard 224445: "describes the roles and functions of a CIMS incident management team at an incident".

This is a full two-day course that is held at the NZ Fire Service National Training Centre in Rotorua.

CRITERIA

- » This course is targeted at Māori Warden Leaders and co-ordinators only.
- » Participants will have successfully completed the CIMS L2 course.
- » 16 participants need to be confirmed before training can commence.
- » All participants **must** stay for the whole course to be certified.

Course costs will be met by the Māori Wardens Project once confirmation that the criteria has been met.

FIRST AID LEVEL ONE & REFRESHER COURSES

The First Aid Level One and First Aid Refresher Courses are delivered to the on how to prepare and respond to an Māori Wardens through The Order of St John. These courses are made up of First Aid unit standards 6400, 6401, and 6402.

Each course is delivered across a full day and participants are required to attend the full day to be certified.

OPTIONS

- » Option 1 Register for a public course. Dates and venue details are held on the St John's website www.stjohn.org.nz.
- » Option 2 Regions can choose to run a 'group course' where a minimum of 15 and a maximum of 20 participants are required.

Course costs for both options will be met by the Māori Wardens Project once confirmation that the criteria has been met. For those that prefer to attend a public course, a voucher is provided.

GENERAL RESCUE AWARENESS

This course introduces participants emergency or disaster. The course is responsive to different learning styles and creates an interactive environment where the learner is central.

The course is held for a half day.

CRITERIA

- » A **minimum of 15** participants and up to a maximum of 20 participants are to be confirmed before training can happen.
- » All participants must stay for the whole duration to be certified.

Course costs will be met by the Māori Wardens Project once confirmation that the criteria has been met.
