



Māori Development is about empowering whānau and community led solutions that improve health and living conditions for all whānau. It is about the retention of te reo Māori and whakapapa as a taonga. It is about preserving and improving systems that support Māori to make decisions about their own whenua and to utilise it if they so wish. It's about enhancing the levels of Māori enterprise and financial stability.

Budget 2017 provides Māori Development funding for the following initiatives:



Whānau

HEALTH AND WELLBEING

\$11 million

to expand whānau-centred support services to more whānau, and to trial mobile health services in rural and remote areas.

REDUCING FAMILY VIOLENCE

\$9 million

to trial whānau-centred approaches to reduce family violence.

YOUTH

\$8 million

to reduce levels of youth suicide and self harm amongst rangatahi Māori.



Whakapapa

MARAE AS CULTURAL CENTRES

\$10 million

to support whānau, hapū and iwi to maintain the physical and cultural integrity of marae across the motu.

TE REO MĀORI

\$21 million

to promote te reo Māori through additional funding for te reo entities, improved broadcast content and whānau participation in te reo environments.

HEALTHY AND AFFORDABLE HOMES

\$8 million

to Kāinga Ora to extend the reach of the Māori Housing Network.

\$9 million

to Te Ara Mauwhare supporting trial pathways into home ownership



Whenua

MĀORI LAND SERVICE

\$30.9 million

to support the development of distinct services for Māori land owners.

TE TURE WHENUA REFORM EDUCATION

\$2 million

to support and increase awareness about Te Ture Whenua reforms and how they will affect Māori land owners, trustees and whānau.



Whanaketanga

ENTERPRISE AND TOURISM

\$10 million

to accelerate the growth of Māori tourism, and increase employment within the sector.

HE KAI KEI AKU RINGA

\$2 million

to establish a fund under Hei Kai Kei Aku Ringa for Māori to help advance their economic aspirations.
