
#### **MCCF Communications update**

### Provider Spotlight: Raukawa Charitable Trust – Phase 1

MCCF has contracted \$0.608m in funding to Raukawa Charitable Trust to assist with lifting vaccination rates for whānau in South Waikato until the end of May 2022.

Raukawa Charitable Trust is the social services arm of the South Waikato-based iwi – Raukawa. They have been providing health and social development initiatives throughout South Waikato since 1987. Their role during the COVID-19 pandemic has been critical to the wellbeing of whānau in their rohe.

Raukawa Charitable Trust lead a number of initiatives in the response to COVID-19 including; recruiting and upskilling a new vaccinator workforce made up of vaccinators, clinical leadership, kaimanaaki and advocates, as well as establishing a mobile team to reach those in the largely rural Raukawa rohe. They worked with primary health organisations where they have existing relationships, along with Tokoroa hospital to increase vaccination uptake amongst whānau Māori in their rohe. They also worked with other organisations such as Whānau Ora to deliver events designed to encourage vaccination.

So far the pūtea provided by the MCCF to Raukawa Charitable Trust has helped increase the vaccination rate for Māori in the Waikato DHB from 79% to 91.4% (first dose) and 64% to 88% (second dose). In addition to these results, Raukawa Charitable Trust report that this mahi has given their team the opportunity to experience the health and iwi welfare sector. Because of the experience gained through this mahi some team members have obtained other permanent employment and others are now seeking to undertake further study in the health sector.

# Te Kotahi o Te Tauihu – approved Phase 2 proposal

Ministers have approved this proposal worth \$0.441m to enable activities that will support whānau through COVID-19 within the Nelson Marlborough rohe.

With the pūtea provided by MCCF, Te Kotahi o Te Tauihu aim to reach the entire Māori population of Te Tauihu including 300 whānau members who experience mental distress. They plan to provide 1,356 welfare packs to whānau who are in isolation; and will continue to support vaccination efforts by reaching up to 5000 people (one third of the population) with boosters. Te Kotahi o Tauihu delivered a successful and highly visible MCCF Phase 1 vaccination programme and while the vaccination rates for Nelson Marlborough are high for all ethnicities (currently sitting at 95% fully vaccinated), there is still work to be done to bring up the vaccinations rates for Māori (sitting at only 88% fully vaccinated).

#### Insights

- Based on indicators of vulnerability (listed in the key below), Northland, Counties Manukau, Waikato and Bay of Plenty DHBs need most support in response to the Omicron outbreak.
- Phase 3 so far has invested the highest proportion of pūtea into Northland, the DHB with the most vulnerable communities.
- Although Te Waipounamu appears to be comparatively less vulnerable, there are pockets of vulnerability which we will look to address.

Count of vulnerable communities (SA2s) A community is included as vulnerable where all below conditions are met: a) Māori partial vax rate <90%, b) Māori pop rate >10%, c) Deprivation Index 8,9,10, and d) Māori population >200

- Our remaining active investments across phases 1 and 2 are focussed mainly on the areas of need based on vulnerability analysis (left hand map), with potential opportunity for further investment in Counties Manukau and Hawkes Bay.
