Minute of Decision

Supporting the Māori Economy and Achieving Economic and Social Outcomes through Te Kupenga Hao Pāuaua

Portfollos Economic and Regional Development / Māori Development

On 25 November 2020, the Cabinet Business Committee:

- noted that in May 2020, Cabinet approved funding of \$7.3 million to June 2021 for the initiative, Supporting the Maori Economy through Social Procurement and invited responsible Ministers to report back by 30 November 2020 on the implementation of the initiative and how implementation aligns with the government's broader procurement strategy [CAB-20-MIN-0219.18]:
- noted the progress report set out in the paper under CBC-20-SUB-0072 on the 2 implementation of Te Kupenga Hao Pāyaya: Supporting the Māori Economy through Social Procurement initiative;
- noted that the proposed policy was outlined in the Labour Māori Manifesto as a commitment to support Whanau Māori enterprise and opportunities through a progressive 3 procurement policy that would set a target for Māori business procurement;
- noted that the policy fits within the scope of the government's Achieving Broader Outcomes 4 Through Government Procurement work programme and Rule 17 'Increase access for New Zealand businesses' [CAB-19-MIN-0213.02];
- agreed to the following policy features: 5
 - a Maori business for government procurement purposes is one that has at least 50 percent Māori ownership or a Māori Authority as defined by the Inland Revenue Department:
 - a procurement target for Māori businesses starting with an initial target of 5 percent of the number of relevant contracts across mandated government agencies;
 - an intermediary independent of government be established to drive a more coherent and coordinated approach;
 - long-term sustainable behavioural change across government procurement evidenced 5.4 by greater supplier diversity;
- noted that Te Puni Kökiri and the Ministry for Business, Innovation and Employment will work together to develop the appropriate guidance and instructions for agencies, including the requirement to report against the target;

- 7 noted that the initial 5 percent target set out in paragraph 5.2 above should be considered a minimum requirement for agencies;
- 8 agreed that an initial review of the policy settings be undertaken in early 2022 by Te Puni Kökiri and the Ministry for Business, Innovation and Employment;
- 9 noted that any future policy changes, including amendments to the target, will be informed by data for the period ending 31 December 2021:
